


Around 16% of children have reading skills that fall below the average range, and 5% have a significant reading impairment.

Poor reading skills can limit children's academic achievement, and increase their risk of emotional health and behavioural issues. It is important to treat children with poor reading early and effectively.


Leading reading researchers from Macquarie University and the Australian Research Council's Centre of Excellence in Cognition and its Disorders used LiteracyPlanet to measure the effects of phonics and sight word training with children classified as poor readers.

The study found that by using LiteracyPlanet children who were poor readers made gains in their reading attainment that were statistically significant, reliable, and large in effect size.





Treatment Effects



Eight weeks of phonics training or sight word training using LiteracyPlanet had large significant treatment effects.
